Village Residents & Staff Support Local Backpack Program

Residents Volunteer with Backpack Program

Residents at Village Northwest Unlimited have joined forces with the Backpack Program to help local children in need of enough healthy food to get them through the weekend. From February through May, groups from the Village spend time two days each week volunteering at the United Methodist Church to fill bags and restock supplies for the program.

During their time, one day is spent bagging food items for the 93 backpacks that are distributed each week through the schools. The second work day is spent restocking and organizing items in preparation for the next packing day. "This is a great opportunity for residents to serve the community," says Jo Johnson, Director of ICF/ID & Program Services at Village Northwest Unlimited. "The Village provides transportation for residents to and from the church and individuals are able to volunteer in the community. It's a benefit for individuals we serve, as well as for kids in the community."

"The United Methodist Church serves as a hub for storing supplies and packing the backpacks," says Tricia Meendering, Children's Ministry Coordinator, United Methodist Church. "We had put out a call asking for help to fill backpacks and members of the Village expressed interest right away."

Staff Raise Funds in Support of Backpack Program

In addition to the residents' service project, staff at the Village took matters one step further in support of the Backpack Program. The Village's PEP committee (People Exciting People) organized a staff fundraiser where with a minimum donation, staff could be entered into a drawing for a winter getaway package to King's Pointe in Storm Lake, IA. The committee's goal was to raise \$500 for the Backpack

> Program. Employees exceeded that goal by raising over \$625 for the program.

"We have a great team of staff at the Village who care about people," says Marcia Vaandrager, Coordinator of Therapeutic Services, Village Northwest Unlimited. "We're delighted to be able to come together in support of kids in the community just as the community has long supported the Village."

The backpack program confidentially provides a food sack every Friday that goes home in a student's backpack at no cost to the family. The backpack program is funded strictly though donations and grants and will only be available as long as there is funding.

• • 5th Graders Hear of Life with a Disability

Village resident, Dianne Ruyter, shared about her life story with the 5th grade students at Sheldon Middle School this past January. The students were reading a book titled *Summer of the Swans*. In the story a young boy was left with a disability after an illness he suffered at the age of three. The teachers thought that being able to hear from someone who has a disability would resonate with the kids.

Dianne talked with students about the car accident where she sustained injuries and about her recovery after the accident. She talked about how her life changed and of the basic life tasks she had to learn to do all over again, which she described as being 'like a baby'. She answered many questions from students about what it's like to live with a disability and how

people treat her differently because of her situation.

Her parting advice to the students...treat people with disabilities the same way you would treat others because they can do all the same things you do. They just do them a little differently.

On January 27, the Advisory Council of VNU hosted Wacky Wednesday. Robotics Provide Independence

Providing dignity for residents is a major part of the mission of Village Northwest Unlimited. This includes helping residents maintain independence at meal time. The Village has obtained assistive equipment to aid residents at meal time. The 'meal buddy' combines robotic technology and personal features in a way that allows residents to enjoy meals with independence.

The meal buddy is a robotic arm that is programmed to spoon food from three

custom bowls. Meal Buddy wipes the bottom of the spoon across a bar to prevent dripping before serving it to the individual. There are multiple settings available that can be programmed to place the spoon within reach of the individual to take a bite. When ready for the next bite, the individual simply presses a

switch for the arm to take the next spoon full of food. It is customizable to individual preferences.

We currently have two residents who are using the Meal Buddy. "For one individual, the Meal Buddy has allowed her to maintain her independence at meal time," says Cheri Brunsting, Occupational Therapy Assistant. "A degenerative muscle disease causes her to have spasms that make meal time extremely frustrating for her. With the Meal Buddy, she's able to maintain independence that is so important for her self-esteem."
