SPECIAL OLYMPICS

All Special Olympic competitions and practices were canceled until further notice in March of 2020. This was a huge disappointment to our VNU Panther coaches and athletes. Our athletes asked often if there was any word on when they could participate again, but the answer was always, "I don't know." When our coaches got word that competition was going to start up again in July of 2021, we had many excited athletes and even the coaches were thrilled to be back on the field. The first competition our athletes competed in was softball skills on July 8th in Manning, IA. In an attempt to start back up with caution, Special Olympics Iowa decided there will be no state competitions this year so all of the athletes earned gold medals at the softball skills competition.

The Panther softball team got the chance to play on July 10th against Sioux City. The team played hard but lost the first game by two runs. The team was supposed to play two games but after the first one a group of dark clouds rolled in and the second game had to be canceled for bad weather. As the team packed up their things, they were met with a downpour. Like softball skills, due to Covid guidelines there will be no state competition.

Panther coach, Sara Wolthuizen said, "It feels great to be back competing at Special Olympics events! We as coaches have missed seeing our athletes compete and show off their God-given talents and the athletes have missed seeing their friends and competing against fellow athletes! It's just an overall win for everyone to be back at it!"

NEW RESIDENTIAL HOMES

Despite everything with Covid, we've been able to continue with our plans to have two new ICF-ID homes built on our campus. ICF-ID stands for Intermediate Care Facility for Individuals with Intellectual Disability. Of the 180 people we serve at VNU, we are licensed by the State of Iowa to serve 60 people under our ICF-ID license. Individuals in the ICF-ID setting are the most vulnerable and have the greatest needs of the people we serve.

The building of these two homes started in April 2020 and the residents moved in on July 6th, 2021. Two new homes were built because the original 12-bed home that was built in the 1970's had reached the end of its useful life, it also was not adequately meeting the needs of the people who lived in the home any longer.

The new homes are each 5,000 square feet and designed to meet the needs of people in wheelchairs. Each of the new homes have 6 bedrooms. Each resident has their own half bath attached to their bedroom instead of sharing a large community bathroom. Each bedroom has a built-in track system in the ceiling allowing for a lift system to assist residents in and out of bed or transport them to the toilet in their bathroom. The hallways are double wide, allowing for two wheelchairs to pass through at the same time, the doorways are wider and the homes have an open concept with a large kitchen, dining area and family room.



Barry Whitsell, President and CEO commented, "On behalf of our residents, who now have a new home, I think it is important to say "thank you" to all the donors who made the Building On Our Promise capital campaign a great success. Without the support of our donor base this project would not have happened this year but our donors saw the need and how these homes fit within the Village's mission of providing Purpose, Privacy and Dignity. With the homes we completed in 2015 and 2016 we now have six new homes that provide a wonderful environment for our residents and allow our staff to give exceptional care to our residents."

16TH ANNUAL RUN, WALK & ROLL
